



TRAVEL:

The most convenient way to reach Yakutsk is via Moscow.

Travel Note:

Please note that the Russian internal airline schedules are not typically firmed up until April or May; therefore, schedules may vary by a day or two.

ITINERARY

Day 1	Depart US
Day 2	Arrive Moscow
Day 3	Moscow/Yakutsk Helicopter to the camp
Day 4 to	10 days of Hunting
Day 13	
Day 14	Return to Yakutsk
Day 15	Yakutsk/Moscow
Day 16	Return to US

The price is all-inclusive from arrival in Yakutsk, except for hotels as needed. The price also includes one round-trip helicopter transfer from Yakutsk to the hunting region and return. If additional chopper transfers are required due to bad weather, additional charges will be assessed, but not more than \$1,000 extra per hunter will be charged.

Non-hunter rates are provided upon request. A minimum of three (3) hunters must be scheduled at one time to keep the chopper rates in line. Additional trophies, if available are: Siberian Brown Bear and Moose.

We opened sport hunting in Yakutia and twenty (20) years later, we are still nearly 100% successful. Join the leaders in the hunting world. We have maintained an office in Moscow for over 20 years - the reason for our continued success. Our service is legendary and when you travel to this part of the world, don't try to save a few bucks by utilizing offers made to you directly from hunting reserves or Moscow agents that don't have a vested, long-term interest in your wellbeing.

A relatively simple itinerary is involved. You fly to Moscow, are met by our crew, then fly on to Yakutsk. Our Yakutian partners are efficient, the sheep populations are strong and everything is in place, making this hunt one of the best values in sheep hunting today. There are five species of snow sheep recognized for record book purposes: Yakutia snow sheep (*Ovis nivicola alleni*); Kamchatka bighorn (*Ovis nivicola*);



nivicola), Putorana snow sheep (*Ovis nivicola borealis*); Koriak (*Ovis nivicola koriakorum*); Okhotsk (*Ovis nivicola lydekkeri*). Generally, any three of the five are considered for entry into the record books under this classification. Please note: Putorana permits have not been issued for several years. Koriak and Kamchatka hunts are covered in our specific flyers.

The altitude in Yakutia is only about 6,000 feet and the terrain is moderately difficult. The sheep are generally found in good numbers in both areas, which over the past 20 years have produced nearly 100% success. Hunting is done on foot, with each hunter having one or two guides.



SEASON:

The season is from August 1 through October 15. The probability of connecting with a Siberian brown bear is rather slim, but if you feel lucky and wish to try, we must obtain a CITES brown bear export permit in advance of your hunt. You will need to pre-pay a CITES bear export permit of \$300, which is non-refundable.

CAMP ACCOMMODATIONS:

Accommodations are in tented camps, equipped with stoves. Three basic but nutritional meals are provided daily, with supplemental food from Moscow brought in to lend more variety to the menu.

If the sheep are more widely disbursed, we encourage spike camping and have supplied the camps with the necessary equipment. Typically, you will spike for 3-4 days, then return to base camp.
